Veteran Alaskan Flyer Buys Angwin Airport

ANGWIN — The Angwin Airport (except for land) at Pacific Union College was sold last week to veteran Alaskan flyer J. Fred Frakes, and will now become part of the operations of Frakes Aviation Co.

In making the announcement of the purchase, Mr. Frakes said that the current program of aeronautics, which includes ground school and the training of pilots, will be continued in co-operation with the Seventh-day Adventist college.

In addition, he said, the program will be expanded to include courses in mechanics and plane maintenance.

The new management also plans to bring in a qualified graduate engineer to establish a center where airplane modifications can be made, and will also make provisions for regular aircraft maintenance includ-

ing engines, instruments and electronic equipment.

Rental, charter, plane, hangar, tie-down, and other services will also be provided, he said.

Sales, Too

The new owner pointed out that services will also involve the sales of aircraft and parts. "It is our intention," he said, "to be set up in such a way that a man can come into this place and receive any aircraft service he needs."

For 23 years, Mr. Frakes operated his own flying business with headquarters in Anchorage, Alaska.

He will be associated in the new venture with Warren Ramsdell, who served previously as the manager of the airport.

Mr. Ramsdell will head the flight school.

The new owner also says he is contemplating adding buildings, extending the airstrip, and making other improvements.

The hangar, five planes, and shop and other equipment are included in the sale.

The land remains the property of Pacific Union College with Frakes Aviation Co. as the new leasee.
