Three Pasadena area men are being held prisoners of war by Japan and Germany, the Navy Department announced last night.

Prisoners are: Thomas Starr Terrill, 2024 Amherst Drive, South

Pasadena; William Kay Kantzer, senior assistant purser, 2375 Adair Avenue, San Marino; Guy Thomas Houston, seaman, 1131 East Valley Boulevard, El Monte.

## Caltech Graduate

A graduate of Caltech, Mr. Terrill was an employe of the American Export Company when it decided to inaugurate a transoceanic air service in 1939.

He was singled out by the company to help inaugurate the service and served as first officer and navigator on a giant flying boat when it made three transatlantic "survey flights."

Mr. Terrill then was employed by the Consolidated Aircraft Company and helped ferry 30 big planes to the Bahama Islands.

## Ferried Planes

Still later he served as navigation commander of an air crew ferrying planes to the Philippines. He had two trips to the islands and on his third flight was captured by the Japanese in Manila and sent to Santo Thomas prison camp. This was in December, 1941, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Terrill, have received no word from him since.
